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As The Wood Turns 9/16/13

Growing up, my parents and teachers would frequently tell me "you get out of life what you put into it." I never fully understood this expression until the summer of my senior year in high school.

That summer, I began working as a bagger at the Sheppard AFB commissary. Unlike my previous minimum wage jobs, as a bagger, my earnings were entirely dependent on tips. As I bagged groceries, I began to notice that the harder I worked, the more money I made. While other baggers took off for smoke breaks or lunch breaks (spending the money they had just made on cigarettes and burgers), I would fill their spots, often jogging back in order to get back in line to bag again. Although it was a mindless job, I found it completely enthralling. For the first time in my life, I felt like I was truly in control of my future. If I wanted to make more money, all I had to do was work a little harder.

The lessons I learned that summer carried me through college, grad school, and into my career as a teacher. Here in the club, I've found my parents' and teachers' advice once again ringing true—with a noticeable difference. As the president of the OPCAAW for the past two years, I've received far more from the club than I ever expected. I've made new friendships, learned new skills, and have benefited from the generosity of several mentors. While there have been challenges along the way, I've truly enjoyed working with such an amazing group of turners.

All of these amazing benefits and people have made this a truly difficult choice—but it's time for me to step down as president of the club. With the start of this school year, my normally busy schedule has become downright frantic: I'm teaching new classes with more students than I ever have before. My own children have started a new school a couple of towns away. My wife needs me to step up more at home to help with running the household. Finally I need to start taking better care of my health. With these new challenges, something has to give. I don't think I can balance these new responsibilities and be an effective president for the club as well.

Being president has been an amazing experience—one that I would strongly encourage you to consider. If you have the time and inclination, you will find that it's a position that pays you back a hundredfold what you put into it.

SAFETY TIP

Rags are one of the most useful items in the shop. Old T-shirts are especially useful: soft, color-fast, almost lint-free, usually in plentiful supply, and incredibly strong. They also have a tendency to grab hold of rapidly rotating wood rather than gliding smoothly and and evenly over it. Paper towels are an excellent substitute for items still on the lathe, especially when using them to apply or wipe off finishes. They are even more combustible than rags, however, so be sure to spread them out to dry thouroughly before disposal.


A DATE TO REMEMBER
