# **Turning Out**

**F YOU'RE ONE** of those woodturners who has been simply "hanging around" for the last few months waiting to decide if you want to give in to the lure of woodturning, now's the time to take the leap—*JOIN THE OLYMPIC PENINSULA WOODTURNERS*. The holiday season spun by with a blur, the New Year turned, and now it's time for our annual membership drive. Our unique system works on a January-through-December basis, so we ask participants to pay their dues in the first few weeks of the year.

Fees are \$30, a pretty modest sum when you consider that card-carrying OPCAAW members enjoy these privileges:

- Access to the extensive club lending library containing a wealth of books and DVDs with turning techniques and inspirational ideas.
- Shared buying power through our glue, sandpaper, and supplies program.
- Discounts at Woodcraft and other retail outlets.
- Participation in our monthly wood auction, where woodturners can purchase donated materials at a fraction of a retail store's pricing.
- Use of our monthly Tool Exchange Table, as well as the access to postings in our newsletter, CHATTERMARKS.
- Eligibility for our end-of-year raffle, when tons of tools, gifts, and certificates are given out.



One of the reasons we prefer that dues be paid now (as opposed to any time during the year) is because they account for about 40 percent of our annual budget -- the other primary source of revenue is the wood auction -- and with money in the bank we can to plan our Speakers Program accordingly. It goes without saying that some of the best speakers travel great distances, and that translates to travel, housing, and other expenses. In that way, OPCAAW members should think of their dues as an investment.

To be honest, we don't beat people over the head and demand a membership card at the door. We take it on faith that every person will carry their own weight and contribute what they can even if they aren't official paid members. We're aware that some people find it difficult to attend regularly, and that there is a percentage of the monthly participants who don't make use of the benefits noted above; they show up simply for the demonstration and camaraderie, and really don't do much else. We understand that some individuals are still mulling over whether or not they want to become fully dedicated to the craft, so they're staying on the sidelines, observing.

But to be clear: We <u>do</u> need all members to pay their dues! And if you have a friend who is a budding turner, enlist him or her, too.

**MEMBERSHIP POSTSCRIPT:** It's not unheard of for a member to pay several years' worth of dues in advance, giving us additional "seed" money to book quality speakers and host better programs. If you're in a position to be a benefactor, please do so. There are other ways you can have a lasting impact on the future of woodturning throughout the Olympic Peninsula putting OPCAAW in your will or setting aside funds for a scholarship, for example, would be useful to everyone. Rest assured every dollar will be put toward enriching the woodturning experience for craftspeople in our region.

#### **WOODTURNING SAFETY**

Run an internet search on "woodturning safety" and you will get a wealth of information. A lot of the information is good, sound advice, but some is excessive and some is contradictory. High school wood shop class safety principles from forty years are seriously deficient in today's world, but are all that many of us rely on. A dust removal system is an allergy- and fire-preventive necessity for any indoor turner, but we used brooms in shop class. Many of us are self-taught, or learn through lore, without any formal safety instruction whatsoever. Some people will do their turning without face and eye protection, and some will turn in open-toed shoes. There is no rigid set of rules that work for everyone in every situation, so take care in selecting the rules that work for *you* in *your* shop.


Wood toxicity tables like these found at <u>The Wood Database</u> or <u>University of Rochester</u> are good references, but be aware that there are many tables, and most are at least a little contradictory.

Woodturning is best enjoyed with all five senses – do what it takes to keep them safe!


