RING A PEN and a pad of paper to the July 30th Olympic Peninsula Woodturners meeting and be prepared to take lots of notes. Four club members - Tones Briggs, Ralph Lindberg, Brad Stave, and Russell Neyman - will be presenting Fifty Nifty Shop Tips, a collection of wonderful ideas for woodworkers. It promises to be an evening filled with tons of useful information.

This is a concept that began with an internet thread that has gone semi-viral, with contributions from dozens of veteran woodturners from throughout the United States, Canada, and England. About two years ago Neyman posted several tips on the SawmillCreek.org Woodturners Forum, and other craftspeople jumped on board to create one of the website's most popular features. Over 30-thousand people have viewed it.

The team of presenters will be sharing the best of these and adding their own, with visual aids and "live" examples of most of the concepts. Actually, there will undoubtedly be more than 50 tips. One aspect of this coming meeting is audience participation as OPCAAW members are encouraged to bring their own ideas and share them with the group.

Subjects are wide-ranging and include everything from abrasives to ziplock bags. It's likely that our club will videotape the program at a later date and distribute it as a DVD.

them when we are married, at holiday feasts, and at rites of passage. Even the Olympics use a flame to symbolize unity and competitive spirit. Lighting a flame is often seen as a new beginning.

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THE CANDLESTICK CONTEST will have two categories: Single units and matching pairs, with prizes awarded for both. Additional special awards might be given for unusual (carved braided twists or segmented designs, for example). All entries should include candles.

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



January 28 looks like the PNW wood artist, Steven Hatcher, will be joining us.




