A Homie, raised in Edmonds, Molly dabbled in pottery with her sister for about six years. There, she learned the importance of aesthetics and design in

three dimensional art work.

Eventually, her husband gifted her a lathe which was set up in their wood shop. After taking an introductory class in turning, Molly was hooked. Something that more than a few of us can relate to. Not having the time to be a production turner, she chose the route of one-of-a-kind art pieces that would stand out to the buying public.



She was inspired by a talk by Graeme Priddle to find inspiration and enhance her turnings using that which was passion in her life. For Molly that passion is Native American and Prehistoric Art, which you can see in the body of her work. She has been fascinated by the petroglyphs of the Northwest as well as the cave art of Lascaux, France and Altimira, Spain.

In a workshop taught by Priddle in Seattle, Molly learned to use nichrome wire to create brands that would texture her bowls and vessels with her in a basket weave pattern that she uses today.

He has a playful style and writes with clarity.

Already you have seen increased use of photographs and a more stylized way of presenting regular features. We have discussed the possibility of a Classified section, where club members can post items for sale and make announcements. Member profiles are also a possibility, as are guest columns and reprints.

We have also made a point to do a better job of letting you know what's going on at the beginning of our monthly meetings. Yes, that steals a few minutes away from our other live presentations, but it also gives us face -to-face interaction. We've noticed a marked enthusiasm in the room this past year; people are willing to speak up and speak their minds. That's a good thing.

websites to solve technical issues and to discuss new techniques. I thought I'd share a few of those:

<u>SawmillCreek.org</u> – This is actually a wide-ranging woodworker's forum, but the Turners page is easily the most popular. I discovered it when I needed help repairing my lathe years ago, joined in on a few discussions, and am now a regular contributor. You must sign up to participate, but it is free. No, you won't get spammed to death.

<u>AAWForum.org</u> – The American Association of Woodturners, of which so many of us are members, is affiliated with our club and we are, in fact, a chapter of that group. No, paying your local dues does not make you a member of the national organization. Membership a number of benefits, including six issues of a printed magazine, six electronic editions, and use of the forum.

Woodturners From Around the Globe (Facebook) – Besides our own FB entries, I have found joining this group tremendously inspiring. Both advanced and novice wood turners post pictures of their projects and receive immediate feedback. It's free of charge, of course, but I believe you need to get approval to join. They're pretty careful to weed out the spammers and hucksters, so expect them to ask you to jump through a hoop or two.

Olympic Peninsula Chapter - American Association of Woodturners (also Facebook) – Same deal as the Globe people, but easier to join and smaller. I'd like to see more of you post photos of the great stuff you do, and I think you might be surprised to see how often you can get immediate advice on something that challenges you in your shop. Using your smart phone, snap a photo, post it, and wait for a response. It's free, and I am the de-facto moderator, so I'll be sure to add you as a member of the group quickly.

<u>YouTube.com</u> – There is probably no woodturning technique, piece of equipment, or product that relates to our craft that can't be found by doing a YouTube search. And you'll see some of our friends there, too—Dave Schweitzer, Robo Hippy, Capt Eddie, etc.

WE ARE VERY CLOSE, to unveiling our new high definition video system, and appreciate everyone's patience during the research process. No, we haven't quite raised all the funds needed, but we borrowed from the club funds to

complete the assignment. The multi-camera mixer has arrived and the cameras have been ordered. We will probably need to pass the hat one or two more times to cover all costs.

We have initiated a series of club raffles to help fund the system. I don't want to steal the thunder from an article elsewhere in this edition of CHATTERMARKS, but any time you can pick up a three-piece set of D-Way tools for a five dollar ticket, you need to jump at that. Same thing with next month's item, a Delta air filtration system.

I suppose we'll have the old cameras for sale when the transition is complete.

**MEMBER DANIEL CAVE** approached me two weeks ago, offering to donate his Jet 14-42 lathe to the club. We may add it to our club lathes for demonstrations, or may put it up for sale. Daniel says it will probably need some cleaning and minor overhaul (replace the belt) so I'm looking for one or two volunteers to tackle that project.

By the way, that's the same lathe I use in my own shop, so I can serve as technical advisor and, if necessary, train the new owner on its features.

Another subject Daniel brought up was the idea of donating funerary urns for deceased soldiers who do not have a family. What a wonderful idea! We're in the process of investigating, and will keep you posted as things develop. --RN

During the March meeting, tickets will be available for our second raffle, which is a Delta Air Filtration system donated by Norm Hix. Briefly, the system, although 10 years old, is in good condi-

It has a 1-1/2 hp motor that is currently set for 240v but easily convertible to 120v. Last year the top bag was replaced with a pleated filter by Wynn Environmental. The filter alone was over \$200. Also included are an assortment of gates, connectors, hoses, clamps and PVC fittings.

All in all, Norm estimates the value of the system at \$300 to \$400. A new 1-1/2 hp Delta or Jet air filter will start at over \$500. This complete system could be YOURS for a mere \$5.00 ticket! (see photo—below)

Grinder rests ... If you are using a grinder rest (and you should be) it works best and is safer if you keep it close but not touching the wheel. After each wheel dressing take a few seconds to evaluate weather you should adjust the position of the guard. I keep my guard close enough that a nickel will not pass through the gap. Please work and play safe. -VW

When working in a shop, Always ask yourself, "What's the worst thing that could happen right now?" Proceed if it's safe. -JTC





#### Club Contest






#### **Parking Lot Lights**


