Hole-y Thin-wall, Batman!

July 2017

This month, Kathleen Duncan will be coming from Ridgefield Washington, on the banks of the Columbia River north of Portland, to talk to us about a variety of topics that will all come together in the form of her pierced, thinwalled vessels.

Not only is Ms. Dunaccomplished can an turner in our state, she also is Chair of the AAW WIT committee, or Women in Turning.

To begin her process, she turns her wood to a wall thickness of 2mm. Grain orientation is important, so she will touch on that in addition to discussing the tools she uses and whether she turns 'dry' or 'wet'.

After she gets her project to the thickness she needs, then she starts poking holes in it, using a micro motor and an air driven dental drill. She'll show various ways of de-fuzzing the holes, removing the 'burn', sanding and then finishing the project.

Random poking holes into wood doesn't work unless you have a plan. In this case, Kathleen calls the plan "design". She'll show us how to lay out our design and where to gain the inspiration for the proportion and curves in the layout. Different styles, shape and placement of the holes will all be part of the design. She even plans on revisiting high school geometry which will aid in the overall design. (Note: Calculus will not be required here.)

Her demonstration will also include a short video about the IWCS-International





Wood Culture Society, which will give us an appreciation for the extent to which our craft is demonstrated all over the world.

Perhaps drilling holes into your project or burning designs on the outside of it sacrilegious to the woodturner, however, these techniques in design and embellishment all further the craft into the next dimension which is more art than craft.

Knowing that Kathleen started with a Shop Smith inherited from her father will bring a knowing smile to many faces in the audience, mine included.

There is also a Delta Model 1460 12x36 heavy cast iron lathe with the original cast iron legs. There is also a horizontal boring machine for edge drilling, this is a commercial floor model. furbished and then sold for the club's benefit in the next few months. If you are interested in buying any of them let me know.




