Many times have turned a green wood bowl and left it to dry for a few weeks or months, coming back to find that it has warped so much I wondered if I had enough wall thickness to get it back to round. Then someone told me about turning oval bowls. Really? On purpose, even?

I gave it a shot, but found that I wasn't fast enough moving the gouge in and out to successfully turn an oval bowl. That's when someone else said that it was a special chuck that you had to use to get the oval effect. Oooohhhh! That was the problem. I needed a special chuck.

Dale Larson comes to our rescue this month as he will demonstrate an oval chuck from Vicmarc. Designed by a German, the Vicmarc oval chuck is made in Australia. It is adjustable to various offsets to make a bigger or smaller oval. My eyes





glazed over reading the directions of adjusting the offset, so better I should wait to see it all demonstrated.

Think this is a new fangled thing? Not so. Dale says that the oval chuck has been around for hundreds of years! It is what they used to make oval picture and mirror frames.



Who knew, eh?

Well, it should be interesting, so grab your hat and meet the rest of the group at this month's meeting on Wednesday, February 28. Details of where are on the right border.

OPCAAW Board Approves Bylaws Revision; Membership Will Vote in March

Your OPCAAW Board has unanimously approved a new version of the Club's Bylaws designed to support our non-profit status and make Board activities more transparent to the membership.

The proposed Bylaws are now posted on the OPCAAW website for your review. Look on the OPCAAW home page for the link.

The vote to present the proposed Bylaws revision to the general membership came at the Feb. 12 Board meeting <u>after months</u> of discussion and consideration by Board members.

The Club's Bylaws were last revised in 2004 and left many questions about proper operations of the organization unaddressed.

Bylaws are the equivalent of the organization's Constitution. They outline, in general, the mission of the club, how it will operate, how business will be conducted and the duties of the Board and Club officers.

Bylaws generally do not address details that can change on a regular basis; instead, they identify more lasting aspects of the organization's scope and purpose. Major changes to the OPCAAW Bylaws contained in this proposal include:

References in several sections to the non-profit nature of the organization and its commitment to comply with state and federal laws and rules govern

- and its commitment to comply with state and federal laws and rules governing non-profits. The club intends to file this year for non-profit status, which will make OPCAAW eligible for a range of grants and awards that it has not been able to pursue in the past;
- 2) Combination of the Bylaws with what had been a separate document outlining the duties of each elected officer;
- 3) Updated language proposed by AAW expressing the relationship between the national organization and our club as an AAW chapter;
- 4) More specific procedures for how the club votes to elect officers or conduct other business;
- 5) A provision to allow up to three "at-large" Board members in addition to elected officers. At-large members would have no specific duties, as officers do, but would be added to the Board to broaden the perspectives presented at Board meetings and to encourage more members to become part of the Club's operation. It is believed this provision could help expand the number of people interested in serving as a Club officer;
- 6) The requirement that Board meeting minutes be posted and available for member review;
- 7) A process by which any member can offer a proposal for consideration by the Board;

Let's be honest. No one likes reading an organization's Bylaws. Board members do not expect Club members to be familiar with the provisions of the <u>existing</u> Bylaws. You, the member, expect the Board to fulfill its responsibility to operate the Club, to achieve the club's mission, to protect the organization's finances, and to make sure OPCAAW is sustainable.

It's the Board's belief that this update to our Bylaws was long overdue. We are asking you to get involved now; to review and consider the changes that have been proposed.

The <u>existing Bylaws</u> can be seen on the OPCAAW website. The Board encourages you to read the <u>proposed new Bylaws</u> and ask any questions you may have by emailing the <u>Board</u>.

A motion to approve the new Bylaws will be accepted during the regular February membership meeting, but the motion will be tabled until March 28 so all members will have sufficient time to review and consider the proposal.—JB




John Jordan to present locally






