Using Shavings for Horse Stalls

In the past straw was used for bedding in horse stalls. Straw is softer but tends to be dusty and is harder to clean.

Wood shavings have pretty much replaced straw as bedding. It is lightweight and easy to clean around. The most common varieties of wood shavings used are Pine, Cedar and Oak. Pine is the most desirable as most horses will not react adversely to Pine.

As a woodturner, you may be tempted to

use your shavings in the stall along with purchased shavings. Resist the urge. There are a lot of woods that are not compatible with horses.

Some of the varieties that MUST be avoided are Black Walnut, Cyprus, Maple and Black Cherry. Black Walnut can be extremely toxic to horses even for a short period of exposure. As we know Black Walnut is also very toxic to humans and we must take extra precautions when working with it ourselves.


