Jimmie Allen is a long-time northwest resident and currently resides in Bremerton, WA. Jimmie discovered woodturning during his semiretirement as a finish carpenter. He joined the OPCAAW club in 2003 and was instantly hooked he went on to serve 7 years as the club's Vice President of Training.

After experimenting with various wood turning aspects, Jimmie was drawn to the challenge that wood boxes presented. Since then, he has concentrated his efforts on improving technique, wood selection, design/shape and proportion.

Through this journey, Jimmie also found another creative outlet - the design and crafting of box making tools that helped him to create his signature style of boxes.





For those new to the group here is a brief introduction to me.

I was born and raised in Southern California, Baldwin Hills area of Los Angeles. I was introduced to wood turning when I was in elementary school by



my Grandfather. I had a small metal lathe set up for wood. I graduated with an Industrial Arts major from Cal State Los Angeles after attending L A Trade Tech (electronics technician), Cal Poly SLO (lower division Electronic Engineering), LA valley college (surveying, comp programing, Bus. Law, Accounting). I then taught Electronics and TV repair for LA City Schools for 11 years prior to moving to Medford Oregon and teaching 23 years for Medford Public I used school equipment Schools. most of my teaching career and purchased my own lathe after moving to Gig Harbor 13 years ago. Since finding the OPCAAW at the Kitsap Fair about 6 years ago I have owned many different lathes as I have slowly upgraded. My skills I considered at the novice level until joining the club and through the many opportunities provided through the club I have rapidly advanced to the point I am at today. Club demos. show and tell discussions, weekend workshops, sawdust sessions have all contributed to my growth as a wood turner. I want to encourage all of you to take advantage of the opportunities presented and experiment with what you see as you go back to your lathe. Try new techniques, hone old ones and grow. I find that so rewarding. I also encourage you to consider attending

the regional and national symposiums and demonstrations such as the one coming up in Albany, Oregon and Anacortes, Washington. Symposiums are like trying to drink from a fire hose—so much available and an opportunity to experience woodturners from around the world first hand!

I want to welcome the **new members** of our Board, Michael Block, Rob **Parker** and returning **Brad Stave**. The dedication and continued work of the members behind the scenes is why the general meetings run so smoothly. The Board members, all the people that make the video, sound, glue and sandpaper, wood auction including all the donors, special events, and parties run smoothly because of all of you. BEAD BOWLS/BOXES GUIDELINES:

Beads of Courage members may receive thousands of beads. It is desirable for your boxes to hold them all. As a result, turned or rectangular lidded boxes need to be large. Larger is better! Recommended interior dimensions for turned boxes are: 6" diameter (5" min.), 5" height (4" min.). Recommended interior dimensions for flatwork boxes are: 4" x 6" x 4".

Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable and does not tip over easily. Lids for Beads of Courage boxes should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate so they don't break. Avoid excessively elaborate designs that may easily break or be damaged; remember, hospital rooms have limited storage space.

Finishing of boxes is extremely important! Beads of Courage members who receive these boxes are susceptible to germs/ infections/mold. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold. Please take the time to ensure you are using a safe finishing process that does not contain toxic materials. Also do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.

All kinds of wood are beautiful! Please refrain from painting Beads of Courage boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or burning.

Member turnings can be picked up at the **April 24**th Club Meeting

There will be the following **categories** that work can be submitted:

Pen Turning
Spindle Turning
Bowls
Hollow Forms
Segmented Turnings

Out of the 5 categories a "Best of Show" will be selected and awarded \$150.00

In addition, there will be a second prize (\$75.00) and a 3rd prize (\$50.00)

The awards will be decided by a non-OPCAAW wood turner.

Each piece entered will have a \$5.00 entry fee and each first piece entered by the member will be covered by the Board of Directors. So, if you enter 3 pieces the members cost will be \$10.00.

This money will be used by the club to help cover the cost of the awards and food.

The Sydney Gallery will allow the member turnings to be sold with **33% commission** going to the Gallery. They do not have to be for sale.

Make sure your piece is **signed** and a tag will be provided at check in as well so that your piece can be identified.. The **tag** will need the following information.

- Address (so if there is a sale a check can be sent)




