

Do You Practice at Woodturning?

Today during the woodturning class I got asked about if I still turn late at night? It got me thinking about my routine. I am fortunate in that I have a dedicated space for turning. I don't have to worry about others moving my tools around or anyone complaining (too often) about the mess of chips building up.

Often I do a little bit of turning after everyone else has gone to bed. I started reflecting on what it is I do during these sessions, am I always trying to make something or am I just playing around and experimenting with some new technique or an object I haven't made before.

It turns out, this is my time to practice my craft. Rarely do I have a project in mind but rather I work on getting better at some aspect of turning. I have bunches of started projects waiting to have a little more work done, or even to have finish applied.

A long time ago, I was taught the Japanese learning method of *Kiazen*. A quick Google, gave a brief description of *Kiazen* as: "an approach to creating continuous improvement based on the idea that small, ongoing positive changes can reap significant improvements."

Focusing on improving one small skill, and not worrying about what I had worked on before. Over time, these small improvements add up. This is how I got to be able to do very fine and delicate work.


